Living in Wensleydale nearly 40-years hills and sheep are a popular theme for many of her Needlefelts. The different coloured dyes, textures and natures of wool make it a wonderful medium; from sheep, to wool, to sheep images!

With a passion for nature several of Lizzie's pictures focus on local wildlife threatened by the changing environment – Curlews, Hares, Hazel Dormice and Red Squirrels are amongst the popular images she creates.

Lizzie's favourite needlefelt images are photographed then handmade into greetings cards and sold locally, including at The Station.

I am Nicola Kevane, an artist living in North Yorkshire. My art is inspired by a love of country life, including local wildlife, equestrian themes, working dogs and farm animals.

Sue Lee



On the whole Sue is a self-taught artist, using graphite, or the humble pencil as it is more commonly called in Sue's house, means that the depiction of reality can only be achieved through tone and contrast. The beauty of this is that the lack of colour allows the brain to 'see' into the depth of the picture and allows the on-looker to constantly 're-discover' the picture. Having a desire to push her boundaries however, and with the onset of the first national Lockdown, Sue decided to take a 'leap of faith' into the use of colour and coloured pencils. It was a comment from a well-known coloured pencil artist, Bonny Snowden, that resonated with Sue, 'Trust the process" and, with this, a mantra was born.

Trusting the process and, being armed with graphite and coloured pencils means that Sue can capture the tone and details of her subject to, hopefully, produce a photorealistic piece but also one that keeps its authenticity as, a piece of art. Whether the drawing is of a client's favourite domestic pet or an endangered wildlife animal the passion remains the same, the light in the subject's eye that tells the viewer their story.

I'm a wildlife and pet portrait artist living in North Yorkshire, working to produce beautiful art in coloured pencil in a realistic style.

I rekindled my love of drawing after raising a family and pursuing other careers. My love of art never left me and I have spent recent years learning, through trial and error, what truly brings me joy.

Living in Yorkshire I have all the inspiration I need. The British countryside is beautiful and the animals that inhabit our woodlands and waters hold a special place in my heart. It makes drawing them a pleasure, and I aim to inspire the same sense of awe and wonder in others through my work.


Charles Parry

My primary artistic inspiration is the always picturesque and often dramatic landscape of Teesdale, and through my abstract and semi-abstract paintings I experiment with the expressive, non-naturalistic visual power of colour, form and texture. I trained at Loughborough College of Art and at the Slade School of Fine Art in London.

I spent most of my professional career working as a freelance theatre designer and scenic artist, which included periods at the National Theatre; the Royal Shakespeare Company; the Georgian Theatre Royal, Richmond (where I was resident designer from 2005 until 2011); the Gala Theatre, Durham, and many other theatres and theatre companies around the country - only painting for myself, as and when time allowed (which was not as often as I would have liked). I officially retired last July, and am now spending most of my time trekking, observing, recording and painting in my studio at home in Barnard Castle.

Helen Raisbeck



Helen Raisbeck is an interdisciplinary, process-led artist concerned with material interactions. Working at the intersection of phenomenology, ecology and the Anthropocene, her practice interrogates her lived experience of the world. Inspiration is found in the colour, form and texture of everyday objects and nature.

Using experimental material processes and close up photographic imagery of her work, the familiar is re-presented as unfamiliar in a combination of painting, printing, sculpture and photography. Abstract pieces articulate the material responses encountered in the process of making whilst vibrant colour expresses the inspiration taken from the natural world.

Fiona Robertson



Fiona Robertson is a textile artist, specialising in free motion machine and hand embroidered landscapes. She trained in Fine Art at the Duncan of Jordanstone College of Art in Dundee and currently lives and works from her studio in North Yorkshire.

Fiona's passion for textiles has evolved through many years of experimenting with different techniques before finding her own distinct style.

Through her embroidery she evokes an emotional response to the seasonal rhythms of the landscape. Her work is highly textured and has a dimensional quality that is the result of many layers of fabrics and fibres, machine stitched together to form a base layer for her intricate hand stitching.

Fiona has many collectors of her work in the UK and further afield throughout the USA, Canada and mainland Europe. She exhibits her work throughout the UK, as well as leading workshops, she is also open to commissions.


Ken Shippen
